

Can you see Northern Lights in the Faroe Islands?

Northern lights, also known as aurora borealis, are a rare fantastic phenomenon that can be experienced in the Faroe Islands if you are lucky. They show up mostly during the winter. However, it cannot be guaranteed that they will be observable in any part of the islands, as the winter weather can vary.

Where are the Faroe Islands located?

Faroe Islands are located on 62°N on the south edge of the Arctic Circle. If you are in the Faroe Islands during the winter and the skies are clear, you are likely to catch a faint green aurora if you point your camera in a northern direction when it is dark. Northern Lights are made by electrically charged particles.

Where to go in the Faroe Islands?

If you are in Torshavn, take a ride up Oyggjarvegur and drive up to Sornfelli. If you are in the northern islands head up to the northern part of the country preferably to the coastal village Viðareiði. What are the Faroe Islands like during winter? When is the best time to visit the Faroe Islands?

Though not a lot of tourists travel to the Faroe Islands in February, it may very well be the perfect time to see the polar lights. Anyway, no reason to frown your brows, as the trip can be supplemented with many exciting nature-based experiences on the Faroe Islands.

Is there snow in the Faroe Islands?

Where to chase Aurora Borealis in Greenland?

Popular spots to chase aurora borealis in East Greenland include Tasiilaq (Ammassalik) and Kulusuk on the east coast. The west coast has more great options such as Ilulissat, Kangerlussuaq, Sisimiut, and Nuuk. Read more here.
