How many battery energy storage sites will Georgia Power have in 2026?

Georgia Power has applied for certification of four battery energy storage sitestotaling 500 MW expected to come online in 2026. In a continued effort to limit its use of fossil fuels to mitigate peaks,Georgia Power Company is adding a whole mess of new BESS.

Will Georgia Power offer more battery energy storage projects?

In that filing, Georgia Power signaled its intention to solicit bids for more storage- another 500 MW- in the near future. Georgia Power will build battery energy storage systems (BESS) at four sites across the state, adding 500 megawatts of electrical generating capacity to help meet a growing demand for power primarily by large industrial customers.

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Georgia Power has identified locations for four new battery energy storage systems (BESS) projects totalling 500MW. Each of the proposed projects will consist of four-hour duration BESS. The four new BESS facilities planned and under development are: Robins BESS (Bibb County, 128 MW).

Georgia Power has identified locations for 500 MW of new battery energy storage systems (BESS) authorized by the Georgia Public Service Commission (PSC) earlier this year as part of the company's 2023 Integrated Resource Plan (IRP) Update.

The Mossy Branch Battery Facility is capable of 65 megawatts (MW) of battery storage that can be deployed back to the grid over a four-hour period, adding resiliency to the state's power grid and helping ensure reliable energy for a growing Georgia.

The state Public Service Commission (PSC) voted unanimously Tuesday to certify Georgia Power's plan to build battery energy storage systems (BESS) at four locations. The Atlanta-based utility's proposal, which was approved without discussion, will add 500 megawatts of electrical generating capacity to Georgia Power's energy supply portfolio.

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The Georgia Public Service Commission (PSC) has signed off on Georgia Power's plans to build 500 megawatts (MW) of battery energy storage across four locations, voting unanimously to certify the utility's Application for Certification on Tuesday.
