

What is the potential for solar energy in Croatia?

The potential for solar energy in Croatia is estimated at 6.8 GW, of which 5.3 GW for utility-scale photovoltaic plants and 1.5 GW for rooftop solar systems.

Is solar irradiation a viable energy source in Croatia?

The abundance of solar irradiation in Croatia shall enable photovoltaic energy to become an increasingly cost-competitive power generation source and attract new investments. Croatian solar resource potential Energy Institute Hrvoje Pozar initiated several solar radiation measurements projects in Croatia.

According to the guidelines, Croatia has all the natural prerequisites to be one of the most significant producers of solar energy in the EU, however, this chance has been missed because of an uninspiring legislative framework.

Will Croatian solar photovoltaic market grow by 2030?

Croatian solar photovoltaic market size is still insignificant. However, it has already attracted the interest of reputable domestic and international market players in recent years, and our forecast for its development by 2030 is optimistic.

Are imported coal and oil filling the energy gap in Croatia?

Imported coal, oil and gas are filling the gap. "In Croatia, we have exhausted all of our hydropower resources," said Andro Bacan, a renewable energy expert at the state-owned Energy Institute Hrvoje Pozar, back in the busy capital Zagreb.

Is Cres a solar energy Haven?

Cres and its inhabitants are well ahead of the solar energy curve in Croatia. Around 1% of electricity came from solar in 2022, although its coast is one of the sunniest places in Europe. At first glance, the small Balkan country looks like a renewables haven.

According to analyses, Croatia has the potential to develop up to 7 GW of solar energy by 2030, which is more than the connected power of all installed power plants now. It is estimated that the annual investments will amount to about one billion euros, half of which would be aimed at the construction of solar and wind power plants. Solar tomorrow?

If the current trend in solar power plant development continues, Croatia could reach a solar capacity of 963 MW by 2025. It's also forecasted that Croatia will have 1,340 MW of solar power by 2026, and possibly 7 GW of solar energy by 2030.

Recent solar photovoltaic (PV) market activity and renewable energy capacity tenders in Croatia. The Croatian government approved in May 2020 a new tender framework for power plants based on renewable energy and co-generation. This framework assumes the country allocates approximately 1,100MW (1.1GW) of solar power capacity.

Croatia offers many opportunities for developments in the renewable energy sector, particularly solar energy. The country has one of the highest insulations in the EU, between 2000 and 2700 hours of sunshine a year. With these potentials, Croatia could become one of the most significant producers of solar energy in the EU.

According to the lobby group's internal data, Croatia is on track to reaching 418 MW of installed capacity by the end of the month, with 2 GW of solar projects in the pipeline, she said.

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
