

What is Laos energy security?

Laos Energy Security (LES) is a part of the U.S. Government's initiative: "Enhancing Development and Growth through Energy" (CLEAN EDGE Asia). CLEAN EDGE Asia supports expanded access to energy, promotes energy diversification and trade and integration of clean energy markets, and strengthens energy security throughout the Indo-Pacific region.

How is Laos promoting hydropower development?

The Lao government has been actively promoting hydropower development, both for domestic consumption and for export to neighboring countries, such as Thailand, Vietnam, and Cambodia. In addition to hydropower, Laos has also been exploring other renewable energy sources, such as solar and biomass.

Why does Laos lag in infrastructure development?

Laos lags in infrastructure development and lacks the capacity to fund many of its projects. According to the Lowy Institute, more than half of Laos' official development finance is geared towards energy projects, especially hydropower projects, which is more than double the regional share.

What is LES doing to promote Lao women's engagement with the energy sector?

LES has since planned a quarterly series of future themed luncheons to promote Lao women's engagement with the energy sector. Hired and onboarded the LES Scholarship Program Manager, Private Sector Grants Manager, and Technical Director.

Does Laos have a solar power plant?

In addition to hydropower, Laos has also been exploring other renewable energy sources, such as solar and biomass. The country's first large-scale solar power plant, with a capacity of 10 MW, was commissioned in 2018, and several other solar projects are currently under development.

Can Laos become a regional energy hub?

It has facilitated a 100 megawatts of cross-border power trade from Laos to Singapore via Thailand and Malaysia, with Phase II commencing in September 2024, seeking to double capacity. For Laos, the APG has immense potential to turn it into a regional energy hub, generating new revenue, jobs, and local industry.
