

## **St Vincent and Grenadines modular solar battery system**

The Caribbean Development Bank has approved financing of \$8.6 million to St Vincent Electricity Services Ltd (Vinlec) for the supply and installation of solar photovoltaic (PV) systems at company buildings in the vicinity of the Argyle International Airport.

An IRP was completed by the Government of St Vincent and the Grenadines, through the Energy Unit in collaboration with the Rocky Mountain Institute (RMI), Clinton Climate Initiative and VINLEC in 2017. The results of this project were presented in the St. Vincent and the Grenadines National Electricity Transition Strategy Report.

In continuation with the extension of Mustique's solar road map on the private island in St. Vincent & The Grenadines", DHYBRID integrated a 500 kW/1000 kWh Tesla battery system into the existing renewable energy installation.

The Commissioning of the Union Island Solar PV and Battery Energy Storage System on March 25, has been hailed as a significant milestone in the energy sector of St Vincent and the Grenadines. Officials and stakeholders involved in the local energy sector have said this project is a game changer which is expected to bring numerous benefits including the much ...

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The combined generation infrastructure is termed a solar/battery/ diesel hybrid system. The Mayreau hybrid generation project is expected to have a significant impact on electricity generation on the island.

The most recent projects are a 580kW PV and battery energy storage system on Union Island, which was commissioned in 2019, and a 100kW solar microgrid on Mayreau island, which was commissioned in February 2020.

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There is a hybrid system used on the island to produce electricity. VINLEC uses diesel engines to generate electricity and there is also a solar photovoltaic (PV) and Battery Storage system which was installed in 2019. Electricity was introduced to St. Vincent and the Grenadines in 1931 by the then Crown Colony Government.

The Mayreau Microgrid Solar Project is in its final stage, which is the testing and commissioning of the solar photovoltaic (PV) and Battery Storage system. St. Vincent Electricity Services Limited (VINLEC) and the Rocky Mountain Institute - Carbon War Room (RMI-CWR) partnered on this initiative which introduced renewable energy for electricity ...

The Grenadines island of Mayreau will be home to the First Solar Battery Storage Microgrid System within the state. In December 2017 Vinlec and EcoEnergy, N.V a Curacao solar energy firm, signed a contract to begin the engineering, procurement, and construction of the system.
